

Positive member survey results

The MiEnergy Board of Directors and employees were presented with the results of the membership survey that was conducted in the third quarter of 2023.

I was very pleased to see that our highest-rated attribute was our employees. Many challenges we face in operating the cooperative leave us with minimal control. Yet, our employees understand it's the membership they work for, and service is job number one, which we can influence.

I am grateful to have an outstanding team of employees at MiEnergy; in addition to being professional, friendly, courteous and highly trained, they also delivered improved survey attributes in minimizing extended outages, convenient payment options, restoring power quickly, providing community support and being easy to reach. Specific comments were made by members who expressed an appreciation for having a "person" answer the phone during our working hours, which we have no plans of changing.

MiEnergy also received very favorable survey marks on minimizing blinks and momentary outages, resolving issues or problems, communicating with members, addressing environmental concerns, providing accurate and easy-to-understand electric bills, providing oversight by our governing board of directors and keeping members informed on the status of outages, in addition to having our members' best interests at heart.

Membership identity was also an important part of our survey. The survey showed that 50% of our members viewed themselves as a "customer," and 36% considered themselves as "both" a customer and "member-owner." If you receive your electricity from MiEnergy Cooperative, you are a "member-owner," which is a significant difference from an investor-owned utility (IOU) that serves customers and ratepayers.

Board room highlights | Dec. 21, 2023

- Received a favorable financial report for November and year-todate projections. The board approved a five mill PUCA credit on members' electric bills for December.
- Selected members to serve on the nominating committee for districts 2 and 3.
- Received the Key Ratio Trend Analysis presentation benchmarks for MiEnergy compared to electric cooperatives from supplemental lender Cooperative Finance Corporation.
- The quarterly safety report was provided.

Under an IOU, such as Alliant or Xcel Energy, your interests lie on the side of the electric bill transaction, while the interests of the IOU's shareholders lie on the other. The IOU generates profits on behalf of its shareholders. In contrast, at MiEnergy, our sole charge is to deliver safe, reliable and affordable electricity to you at cost. Yes, MiEnergy makes a margin, but that margin pays for unexpected expenses and smooths out bill impacts. At the end of the year, margins are allocated back to the membership and then paid out in the form of capital credits or power cost adjustment credits.

MiEnergy members also have a voice in your electric cooperative.

You select and elect your directors from the membership to represent your interests on the board of directors. Districts 2 and 3 are currently going through this process as part of the 2024 election.

If you have a question or concern, you can contact your cooperative directors or give me a call, drop me an email or stop by the office to visit. It's much more difficult for IOU ratepayers to meet with their utility's leadership than it is for co-op members to meet with theirs.

In addition, MiEnergy works to support our local communities in southeastern Minnesota and northeastern Iowa. As an example, last month we received notice that we were approved for a \$2 million USDA economic development loan for Upper Iowa Beef processing facility. The Sunflower Child Development Center, La Crescent Fire Department, Chatfield Economic Development Park and the Lanesboro Fire Department are other examples of loans made possible through MiEnergy.

The survey attribute that scored the lowest referenced electric rates. MiEnergy members receive cost-of-service rates that reflect our low density in the rural areas (4 members per mile of line) and 5,500 miles of distribution lines in some of the most challenging terrain. Our electric rates are often lower than nearby IOUs when you look at the total bill. Yes, our basic service charges are higher, but the IOU kilowatt-hour (kWh) charges have exceeded 18¢ to 20¢/kWh after adding the fuel and rate adjustment charges.

In the end, MiEnergy received very positive results from the membership. Thank you. However, we undertake these surveys every year to identify areas where we can improve, and that is exactly what we will do with the survey results.

We look forward to a productive and successful year for MiEnergy in 2024.

At MiEnergy, one way we invest in the next generation of rural leaders is by participating in the national Electric Cooperative Youth Tour program. Winter season peak a

During the winter months, you may see messages on local television stations, hear messages on the radio or view posts on social media from MiEnergy regarding peak alerts. This is something the cooperative has communicated to members for decades. A peak alert indicates that demand for electricity is predicted to be high on the regional grid. While demand may be higher than usual, sufficient generation is still available. When members use less electricity during high-demand periods, it helps keep electric rates affordable.

You may wonder why a peak alert would be issued on a mild winter day. The regional grid expands beyond the tri-state area and includes 15 states and a Canadian providence. While demand for electricity regularly changes hour by hour, weather changes within this footprint can cause higher demand.

During winter months, peak alerts can be for morning, evening or both. Members enrolled in energy management programs for dual fuel/interruptible heat have their heating system managed from approximately 7 a.m. - 11 a.m. Members enrolled in the cooperative's dairy water heater and grain dryer programs will see systems managed during the evening from 5 p.m. - 8 p.m.

Members can conserve electricity by lowering the thermostat on their heating systems to at least 68 degrees, running the dishwasher or doing laundry outside the conservation timeframes, using a microwave instead of the oven to cook, and refraining from turning on televisions and gaming systems. Each seemingly small action can collectively make a big difference in the demand on the electric grid.



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SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Only authorized utility workers should approach a substation, touch the fence or enter the gate.

Paying attention to activity in or near substations and other utility equipment helps keep everyone safe.



- Wear proper personal protective gear and display an ID badge.
- Use work vehicles that have utility branded logos/information.

Suspicious activity includes individuals in street clothes

- Near or inside a substation fence.
- Tampering with equipment, such as power poles, meters and padmount transformers.

If you notice anything unusual at a substation, please report it to the electric utility. **Examples include:**

- An open or unlocked gate.
- A damaged fence.
- Obvious damage inside the fence.

Call 9-1-1 and then the electric utility if you see:

- Smoke or fire.
- Non-utility workers inside the substation fence
- Non-utility workers on a pole or tampering with

Colder weather can increase energy use and bills since heating accounts for the highest wintertime energy consumption in most homes.

A forced-air furnace is the most common type of heating system and is fueled by natural gas, propane, oil or electricity. Heat pumps are growing in popularity and are available for forced-air systems. If you have a forced-air system, check the filter regularly and replace it when it's dirty.

The easiest and lowest-cost way to save money on heating is to keep your thermostat as low as your comfort will allow. The U.S. Department of Energy recommends a thermostat setting of 68 degrees in the winter while you are awake and lower when you are asleep or away from home. Keep in mind that setting the temperature too low can cause pipes to freeze or moisture issues in some geographic locations. Adding an additional layer of clothing, slippers or a hat can keep you comfortable in a cooler home.

Do you use electric resistance space heaters to heat a room or small section of your home? If so, you may see an increase on your electric bill. Operating that same space heater for 12+ hours a day could cost you an extra \$100 a month or more, depending on the wattage and hours used.

If you choose to use space heaters, use them safely. Keep them 3 feet away from anything flammable, do not leave them unattended and plug them directly into the outlet, not an extension cord or power strip.

Just as we put on a windbreaker to keep cold winds from blowing through a sweater, your home also benefits from blocking air movement. Air sealing can significantly improve the comfort of your home and provide energy savings. A common air sealing practice is applying weatherstripping to exterior doors and windows. You can also seal around plumbing penetrations to help eliminate drafts. A gap often exists between the drywall or wood and the plumbing pipes and drains. Filling these gaps with expanding foam can reduce drafts in bathrooms and kitchens.

Cold, windy winter days are the perfect time to find opportunities for air sealing. Rattling doors or moving curtains can indicate air leakage. Air leakage occurs when two different materials, like drywall and trim work, come together. Cracked plaster and gaps in drywall can also cause drafts. Sealing the gaps saves energy and improves comfort.

As outdoor temperatures dip this winter, take a few proactive steps to maintain comfort in your home and to keep your energy bill in check.
